Title V MCH internship program

Abstract

During Oklahoma's Child Death Review Board (CDRB) Meetings, it was discovered that in cases of infant death, there was a discrepancy in caregiving information and practices when grandparents were documented as primary caregivers or had an influence on their children's caregiving practices. In Oklahoma, 12.6% (43,383) of grandparents are responsible for their grandchildren. Due to these findings, different work groups collaborated to develop a Toolkit to provide grandparents with evidence-based information on caregiving topics.

Objectives

- By the end of July 2025, participants
 who have received at least one of the
 ten Toolkit's educational topics will
 show an increase in knowledge on
 how to raise their grandchildren with
 updated caregiving information.
- Participants will have utilized at least one of the resources shared during the workshops.
- Participants will have increased their confidence about having the needed skills and knowledge to take care of their grandchildren.

Methods

- Created, distributed, and analyzed mixmethod surveys to identify grandparents needs (n=112).
- Designed the program description and implementation for the Toolkit.
- Researched and studied Oklahoma's global landscape to create educational materials.
- Created the program evaluation plan and Research design to track program's impact and implementation success.

Results

Survey results:

- 10 topics of interest were identified.
 Top 5: Discipline, engaging with children, mental health, body autonomy, nutrition and health.
- Grandparent's shared concerns and challenges.


