

Residency Co-Directors Corner: Dr. Kevan Craig

Residency Site Director Children's Hospital Los Angeles

How did your interest grow in rehabilitation medicine?

In the summer break between my first and second year of medical school, I started a research project with Dr. Jacquelin Perry at Rancho Los Amigo Medical Center. She introduced me to Dr. Lance Stone, the Chief of Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) at Rancho. Dr. Stone asked about my specialty, and I mentioned PM&R, specifically TBI because of my experience with patients who recovered so well after a devastating brain injury. He recommended that I explore Pediatric PM&R by doing a rotation with Dr. Dennis Matthews at Denver Children's Hospital. I followed his advice and fell in love with the field. The more I learned, the more passionate I became about it. This feeling continues today.

What are your responsibilities at CHLA?

I am responsible for the entire division of Pediatric Rehab Medicine (PT/OT/ST, acute inpatient, and outpatient rehab). I am currently looking to hire someone to help me cover these services.

What is a typical day like for you?

I like to get to the hospital between 4-4:30 AM. I answer emails and talk to the nurses about overnight issues. When the residents arrive, I discuss the cases with them. Somedays we have Care Progression Rounds or Huddles where all the therapists, program coordinator, social worker, charge nurse, and medical team meet and discuss the patients. Then we round on our patients. After rounds, we do consults, team and family conferences, admissions, and discharges. Once per week, we have rehab follow-up clinic. On certain days we have grand rounds and other educational activities as well.



What advice would you give to your former self?

As far as my path goes, I wouldn't change a thing. As far as my personal life goes, I wouldn't take things so personally and would enjoy the process more. I would take time to really understand where people are coming from and not to judge. I am more aware of this now, but it wasn't always like this.

What is your fondest memory of residency training?

I did a combined Peds/PM&R residency at the Children's Hospital of Cincinnati and the University of Cincinnati. The comradery there was absolutely the best. At Children's Hospital, there were usually nearly 20 residents on call. We always helped each other out. If one resident was slammed, the other residents would help. The teamwork was incredible.

Any updates about CHLA?

Because I'm so busy, I'm looking to hire someone part-time to help with clinics and to cover for me for vacations. While I prefer someone who is Pediatric Rehab trained, I am open to anyone with a general PM&R background. I have many new programs in mind but will need help to get them off the ground.

Pain Fellowship Co-Directors Corner: Dr. Allen Chen

Fellowship Site Director UCLA

How did your interest grow in rehabilitation medicine?

After graduating from Harvard, I spent four years working various jobs around the globe trying to figure out what I wanted to do as a career. I was on the peak of Mt. Elbrus in Russia (one of the seven summits) as part an expedition team for the National Foundation for the Blind, helping a blind climber complete the first blind ski descent of the mountain. It was there, at 18,500 feet altitude, that I decided to pursue a career in which I could help those with functional injuries live a full and robust life. I was fortunate to go to medical school at NYU where we had a strong PM&R department and presence. Out of my class, a half dozen of us went into the field. Having early exposure to the PM&R allowed me to weigh my options as I progressed through various rotations, and the combination of outpatient clinics, procedures, and lifestyle was appealing to me.

What are your responsibilities at UCLA Spine?

My main role at the UCLA spine center is to provide quality, evidence-based, and patient-centric nonoperative spine care. The vast majority of spine care is non-surgical, so my partners and I all have very busy clinical practices. Our interventional physiatry group is close-knit and very supportive of one another. In addition, as the Co-Director of the UCLA/West LA VA Pain Fellowship and the Course Director of the UCLA David Geffen School of Medicine Outpatient Spine Clerkship, I am very involved in training and education for fellows, residents, and medical students. I also represent UCLA Spine and Physiatry as an instructor for the International Pain and Spine Intervention Society (IPSIS) and North America Spine Society (NASS).

What advice would you give to your former self?

Never stop learning. Residency and Fellowship are just the tip of the iceberg. Our field is constantly changing and evolving, and there are ample opportunities to contribute to that evolution



whether it's through research, teaching, or being involved in national and international societies. Also, choose a geographic location that keeps you engaged, happy, and fulfilled outside of work. Whether it's the ocean, mountains, restaurants, or going out until 4am (or all of the above), figure out what gives you day-to-day joy and find a place that provides it.

What is your fondest memory of residency training?

I did my residency at the University of Washington in Seattle. In addition to meeting and working with some incredible co-residents who are now leaders in our field, I was able to have a lot of fun! Kitesurfing in Hood River, Oregon, weekday night skiing in Snoqualmie, wakeboarding on Lake Washington, and going out until 4am in Belltown and Capitol Hill are my fondest memories of residency.

Any updates about UCLA Spine?

Yes! After receiving much feedback from current and prior ACGME fellows about their positive experiences on the UCLA spine rotation, we are happy to be adding a second fellow to our rotation. As our group has grown, we now have more than enough clinical volume to support an additional fellow. Starting in 2024, we are increasing to five total fellows, and will have two concurrent fellows on the UCLA Spine rotation, with each fellow rotating with Dr. Fish, Dr. Solberg, and myself for around 5 months of their one-year fellowship. Our interventional spine/physiatry group continues to grow, and we are hopeful that we can continue to expand both our geographic and educational impact.






